


JUNE IS AUDIOBOOK MONTH—LISTEN TO A BOOK

The Audie Awards, which honor the best Audiobooks of the year, were held on May 29, 2014 at the New York Academy of Medicine in New York City. The Audie Awards are sponsored by The Audio Publisher's Association.



Billy Crystal won the **Audiobook of the Year** for *Still Foolin'Em*. Mr. Crystal was both the author and narrator of the


book. This book also won in the Humor category.



Best Non-Fiction book was won by Malcolm Gladwell for David and Goliath which he also narrated.




For **Best Fiction book**, Doctor Sleep by Stephen King was the winner. This book was read by Will Patton.

guished fiction earlier this year. *The Goldfinch* was read by David Pittu.




For Multi-Voiced Performance, World War Z: The Complete Edition by Max Brooks was the winner. Max





Sunday, June 15th is Father's Day. Here are some notable fiction and non-fiction titles that feature strong father figures. Any one of these selections would make a great book club choice.





Bee Season Myla Goldberg Myla Goldberg

Tuesdays with Morrie by Mitch Albom

A man re-connects with his old college professor in the last few months of his life. **Brother, I'm Dying by Edwidge Danticat**

The author is placed in her Uncle Joseph's care at age four when her parents left Haiti for America. At twelve, she joins her parents in New York City leaving behind Joseph and the only home she's ever known.

The Bee Season by Myla Goldberg*

Nine-year-old Eliza Naumann is considered an unspectacular child, until she surprises everyone by winning her school spelling bee. But just as Eliza begins to shine, her family starts falling apart.

The Ha-Ha by Dave King

Wounded years earlier in Vietnam, Howard Kapostash is unable to speak, read, or write, although his intelligence is normal. Now middle-aged, he lives a lonely existence. But then his former high school sweetheart entrusts her nine-year-old son to Howard when she enters drug rehab. Suddenly a father figure, Howard begins to open up, and the emotional wounds of his past start to mend.

To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee*

The explosion of racial hate in an Alabama town is viewed by a little girl whose father defends a black man accused of rape.

The Road by Cormac McCarthy

In a post-apocalyptic America, a father and his young son walk toward the coast, left with nothing but each other. They persevere, and their relationship comes to represent goodness in a world that is utterly devastated.

Gilead by Marilynne Robinson

In 1956, as a minister approaches the end of his life, he writes a letter to his son chronicling three previous generations of his family, a story that stretches back to the Civil War and reveals uncomfortable family secrets.


Extremely Loud and Incredibly Close by Jonathan Safran Foer




